Dear Alumnae,

PARENTS, GUARDIANS, AND FRIENDS,

The 2019-2020 school year was one for the history books. It required superhuman resilience, flexibility, hope, and faith.

I found inspiration in a reflection by Pope Francis published in the Spanishlanguage magazine *Vida Nueva* titled, "A Plan for Rising Up." He speaks of Christ's Passion and how the women did not allow those events to paralyze them. I saw our beautiful family at Regina Dominican illustrated in his words:

"They were able to move forward and not allow themselves to be paralyzed by what was happening. Out of love for the Teacher, and with their typical, irreplaceable, and blessed feminine genius, they were able to confront life as it came...they knew simply to be and to accompany."

Faculty and staff stepped up to adjust their teaching and work to the reality of eLearning. The Board of Directors, alumnae, donors, and our Adrian Dominican Sisters experienced pain, loneliness, and stress as well, but still showed up to support the school. Perfection is not possible in an imperfect world but you did your best and your best was extraordinary! I am grateful for every one of you and see the perfection in who you are and in your hard work through this difficult time. I see a "civilization of hope" in you and am inspired to build on that.

Not only did we outperform every school in the area from an engagement and attendance perspective (over 95% even through the worst of the pandemic!) but we also still managed to keep our eyes on the prize. Work on our strategic plan was steady and focused. Our faculty and staff put forth Herculean effort in quickly converting to all eLearning, facing the uncomfortable truth of racism in our midst and finding ways to combat it, finishing the year with a balanced budget and slight increase in our scholarship endowments, and producing record student and parent satisfaction!

All of this is not possible without the generosity of people like you. I hope you enjoy seeing a glimpse of the fruits of your investment in Regina Dominican in the



following pages. Our strength as a small school that can be nimble in the face of adversity is on clear display. We are not through this crisis, but we are prepared for it and are facing it from a place of strength. Your unwavering support, love, and prayers are fueling us for success, and for that we are forever grateful. Thank you for giving our young women the chance to "confront life as it came" through your generosity.

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Year in Review:

AN INTERVIEW WITH DR. KASSIE PORRECA

For many of us, 2020 has been a year like no other. Dr. Kassie Porreca reflects on how the past several months have allowed Regina's unique strengths to shine.

What word or phrase would you pick to capture the "theme" of Regina's 2019-20 school year, and why?

Our official school theme for the year, selected by our Dominican Preachers, was "Be a Rose Among the Thorns," which definitely turned out to be prophetic, as we spent the last quarter of the year working hard to stay connected and positive, and helping each other navigate the uncharted territory of living through a global pandemic. We were all called to be roses among the thorns for each other, and for our families and friends.

But if I had to pick an unofficial theme, I think it would be "Family for Life."
The strength of our Regina Dominican family was evident. Being deprived of our opportunity to be together every day on our campus in many ways made us grow even closer and more precious to each other. I had a student e-mail me to say, "I promise I will never wish that I could stay home in my pajamas instead of coming to school again!" and I believe her!

What was your favorite Regina moment from this past year?

I loved being together with our community every Wednesday morning when we gathered as a whole school for our newest tradition, our weekly Morning Meeting. It was such a joyous gathering each week. We gave "Paws Up" to students and staff, prayed together as a whole school, celebrated birthdays and other events (English teacher Morgan O'Leary even announced her pregnancy to the whole school at a Morning Meeting—and brought down the house!), and then ended with the loud and proud singing of the Loyalty Song. It was such a great way to start the day.

2020 has been a year of historic change in many ways. What is it that allows Regina to adapt so successfully to a rapidly-evolving situation such as the COVID-19 pandemic?

Going through the pandemic really demonstrated to me, and to many other people, the great strength in our school community. We're agile, so we were able to quickly pivot into eLearning without missing a step so that our students kept learning. We really care about each other and know each other well, so we shared video messages, daily bulletins, social media posts, e-mails, cartoons, playlists, recipes, contests-really anything we could think of to stay connected to each other and to keep our spirits up. We listen to our students and value their opinions, so we were able to tailor some spectacular end-of-year celebrations

for our graduating class with their input. We are a faith community, so we shared prayer services, online Masses, virtual prayer intentions, and Zoom Rosary sessions. We are all committed to Regina Dominican, so we were able to thrive.

What are you most excited about for the upcoming school year?

I am very excited about our new partnership with Global Online Academy, which is making it possible for our students to take a wide variety of interesting and unusual courses with students from all over the world. Our membership in GOA is a visible commitment to "Global Citizenship," one of our leadership values. As I write this, we just started accepting applications from students who want to take a course through GOA, and there is a great deal of buzz around their offerings. I know that this partnership will provide the opportunity for our students to take some very exciting elective classes that we don't offer on our campus, so it's the best of both worlds: our students still get to enjoy the boutique close-knit Regina community where everybody knows your name, while at the same time having the chance to expand their worldview by taking courses with teachers and other students from all over the world.

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2020 is not your typical year, and the Class of 2020 wasn't your typical class. Shelter-in-place presented a particularly stinging level of shock and disappointment: no prom, no final season of sports for the spring athletes, no graduation! How could they simply retreat into their rooms, finish up their last few assignments, and walk away from their Regina years without seeing their friends, teachers, and beloved school one last time?

The faculty and staff at Regina wouldn't stand for that. As soon as it became apparent that the COVID-19 quarantine would last far more than a few weeks, teachers, administrators, and some of the seniors themselves put their heads together to find new ways to celebrate.

Emphasis on ways. In non-pandemic years, seniors usually get only one graduation ceremony, but Regina decided that this unusual year was deserving of some unusual grandeur, and planned a roster of events during what came to be known as "The Summer of the 2020 Panthers."

One's senior year of high school is full of memories that last a lifetime—hanging out with your best friends, dancing the night away at prom, and making the most of every moment in your favorite spaces around the school. We wanted our seniors to still be able to enjoy these moments while staying safe and healthy, so we improvised.

Many schools in the Chicagoland area printed and sent lawn signs to their graduates, but we figured we'd add a touch of Regina flair. It's not every day your Principal, Assistant Principal, or other staff members show up to your house with lawn decorations, but again, 2020 is just that kind of year, and Regina is just that kind of school. So one rainy day in late April, every one of our seniors was surprised with a personally delivered lawn sign.

The Alumnae Induction Ceremony was held via Zoom on May 26, during which the Class of 2020 took their Alumnae Oath together, listened to words of wisdom and encouragement from alums **Katherine Kinnaird '08** and Regina English teacher **Annie Tully '92**, and enjoyed a slideshow of senior memories put together by the Junior Class Leadership Board.

The celebrations continued on June 15 with our traditional Baccalaureate Mass. With only cantor **Maya Cornejo '20**, lector **Caraline Quinlan '20**, their parents, and a few staff (including Music Director Noah Pligge) in attendance at the church, mass was celebrated by our school chaplain Fr. Peter Wojcik and broadcast on Facebook Live. The next evening, we convened via Zoom for the Class of 2020 Convocation Ceremony, during which many of our seniors were recognized for their academic, athletic,





disappointment. However, the Regina community sees adversity as a gateway for innovation. The Summer of the 2020 Panthers was a prime example of students, faculty, and staff coming together to take care of one another and find solutions. Events such as Mini-Prom and an outdoor graduation and parade would not have been possible without the bright minds of our Senior Class Leadership Board, the dedication of our teachers and staff members, and the love and support of our families and friends. In many ways, the challenges of 2020 allowed our community to shine as we graduated a class that understands collaboration and problem-solving on a personal level. We know this experience will be formative for the Class of 2020 as they go on to seek solutions to our world's grander challenges, and we couldn't be more proud.

HOW REGINA / hrives IN TIMES OF CHANGE





Since opening our doors in 1958, Regina Dominican has continued to endure throughout more than a half-century of economic, social, and political change. In the last 60 years we have been witness to the Civil Rights Movement, the Cold War, the rise of the Information Age, the tragedy of 9/11, and the Great Recession of 2007—just to name a few examples! We have not simply withstood, but have persevered and continued to evolve to meet our community's changing needs.

The most recent showcase of Regina's ingenuity during tumultuous times arose in March 2020, when the COVID-19 pandemic prompted new policies that would change history. An unprecedented stay-at-home order required all schools in Illinois (including Regina) to temporarily move to remote operations. However, that didn't stop us from doing what we do best: delivering a quality education to our students!

As an intentionally small school, we were able to respond quickly, firmly establishing our new classroom dynamic. We'd already implemented an eLearning platform for those bitter "polar vortex" days in winter, so we were well prepared to make the shift as seamlessly as possible. More importantly, we maintained a curriculum that held students accountable, provided parents access to faculty and leadership, and retained the student body's sense of community.

In times of uncertainty, structure is often the best remedy. Students and staff alike were able to keep a daily routine beginning with a daily bulletin and prayer sent via e-mail at 7:45 a.m. sharp, and from there would continue with

regular assignments, synchronous class sessions, and club meetings over Google Hangouts and Zoom.

Active engagement and accessibility—those are the words that best describe Regina during this quarantine. Teachers have remained actively engaged with students, and parents get daily updates on their daughter's progress and school activities.

What is your vision for your new role as the **Vice President of Finance and Operations?**

We will continue the tradition of great stewardship of resources at Regina and empower our staff to deliver an excellent Catholic education.

What are your favorite hobbies and activities outside of work?

I have been a runner since I was in grade school. I have run multiple marathons over the years and I still run road races. I enjoy playing golf without a scorecard and I have coached and watched a lot of youth sports over the past 20 years.

What is your favorite book that you've read recently?

AN INTERVIEW WITH SANDRA LOCHER:

Regina's Engineering Pioneer



How has Regina's STEM program changed since you started at Regina?

When I began working at Regina in the fall of 2010, there was no official STEM program. After attending a STEM Think Tank conference in Nashville for several summers, the idea of bringing a STEM program to Regina took root. The program was originally designed as a club. After only a few attempts at meeting, though, I very quickly realized the club format was not going to work, given the complexities of the projects we attempted and the girls' busy schedules. I quickly pivoted and focused on developing an actual STEM class with an engineering focus. I developed the course curriculum for Principles of Engineering based on the club concept and presented the course proposal to Regina's Curriculum Council in 2016. I was thrilled when the course was unanimously approved! Principles of Engineering was first offered in the fall of 2017. This fall marks the fourth year of the class, which has since been renamed Foundations of Engineering.

What are Regina's current offerings? What makes them unique compared to other high schools in the area?

Starting this fall, Regina continues to offer Foundations of Engineering, and now we have added a second engineering course from the Project Lead the Way curriculum called Introduction to Engineering Design. This fall, we are also adding AP Computer Science to our course offerings. Our courses are unique because only young women are taking them!

Why do you believe it is important to expose Regina students to more STEM opportunities before they go to college?

It is important for our students to understand what current and new opportunities there are in the STEM fields. Engineering, specifically, has a reputation as a maledominated field. Women, however, possess all of the abilities necessary to be successful engineers. They are born problem solvers and possess the desire to make people's lives better. My goal is to ensure that my students realize that engineering is about devising creative solutions to society's problems. And, no matter what area interests you, there is an engineering field associated with it. I also make a determined effort to introduce my students to women engineers who can serve as role models. This goal is accomplished through alumnae visits from current engineering students, class projects that focus on women engineers, and field trips that expose the students to women engineers in leadership roles.

What are some of your students' recent accomplishments in STEM?

One of the exciting projects we complete each semester is a Design Thinking project that involves the redesign of a shopping cart. By following the Design Thinking model, students are required to create a new design focused completely on the end users' needs and criteria. The girls' creativity abounds when they brainstorm ideas on sticky notes and then build and present an actual prototype of a new shopping cart design. Another popular project involves students building a marble run out of cardboard. The challenge for the groups is to have the marble stay in the run for a minimum of 30 seconds. While 30 seconds may seem like an easy goal, it is rather challenging to build a structure that meets this design criteria.

While eLearning this past spring, students completed projects in upcycling, paper engineering, and stop-action movie making. Again, they showcased their ingenuity and creativity while completing these projects at home!

Where do you see your program going in the future?

I would love to see more and more of our students take our STEM courses and for Regina to add even more course options. I also hope to have many of my prior students return as working engineers to share their real-life experiences.

Is there anything you'd like to add?

I am very thankful for the support the STEM program has received over the past few years from my colleagues, administration, and our amazing Regina parents. And, I would be remiss if I did not specifically mention Joan Kitchie. Joan and her Advancement team provided financial support so I could set up my amazing STEAM Lab, complete with three 3-D printers, project materials, and 12 laptops.



MEET PATSY MUELLER:

Resident Chemistry Expert

Regina Dominican Chemistry teacher Patsy Mueller recently co-authored a comprehensive guide to Advanced Placement Chemistry. Released this August, *Multiple Choice & Free Response Questions in Preparation for the AP Chemistry Examination, 7th Ed.* is an educational text sold exclusively to teachers and schools to prepare their students for the annual AP Chemistry Exam. Patsy worked on the book's 4th and 5th editions as a content editor, and she joined the 6th and 7th editions as a contributing author.

Her extensive knowledge of AP Chemistry material and her work developing this book directly benefit her students. As she explains, "My students profit from this because I am a better question writer for my own tests. I can write them using 'ETS-speak,' a technical writing skill used on standardized chemistry tests." As one could expect, her students have historically performed very well on national-level chemistry exams.


Ms. Mueller is one of the nation's foremost educators in advanced high school chemistry. She has served as a Reader for the AP Chemistry Exam for 20 years and a Table Leader for 16, meaning that she scores the exams and leads other scorers on her team each year. Ms. Mueller trains other AP Chemistry teachers as well. She states:

I prepare first-year chemistry teachers to become AP Chemistry teachers, taking them through the advanced curriculum and lab work that can be performed in high school time frames and with high school budgets. 77

Ms. Mueller also has worked to develop SAT and ACT tests. She served three terms on the Test Development Committee for the SAT Chemistry Subject Tests, and at the ACT, she was a member of the Passages Research Committee. On this committee, "articles suitable for analysis are examined and suggestions are made about questions on the test," she says.

Regina Dominican is extremely proud to have Ms. Mueller as a member of its faculty. She is a treasured member of the Regina community, a favorite amongst students, and an inspiration to many of our alumnae who have gone on to pursue chemistry and related STEM fields.







REGINA GIRLS LEAD!

INTRODUCING THE NEW LEADERSHIP BADGING PROGRAM

This year, the Leadership Institute launched a new Leadership Badging Program created by Director Jennifer Herrington. The leadership competency badges are aligned with the Regina Dominican leadership model, and each year focuses on a different quadrant of the leadership shield: Authentic Self-Confidence, Joyful Learning, Compelling Communication, and Global Citizenship. "Our goal is for every student to engage in a range of leadership activities that enhance her personal leadership development for success at Regina Dominican and beyond," explained Herrington. "Through the badging program, students develop awareness of their unique strengths and capabilities through assessment, experience, and reflection and become effective leaders who have the desire and ability to lead others. We know Regina Girls can make a difference and have a positive impact on the world."

This innovative badging program, recognized with a grant from the White Foundation for its dedication to the future good, was

piloted with freshmen and sophomores. Authentic Self-Confidence was the focus area. Through participation in advisory activities, self-assessments, leadership workshops, and a culminating project, students learned how to act from their inner authority, celebrated their unique strengths and abilities, and gained confidence as everyday leaders. In reflecting on her confidence level. Grace Schnier '23 wrote: "I learned through this experience that while I may not stumble upon natural confidence right away, good communication is one of my strengths, and when that is put into use and received well, I feel like I can continue down my path with a strong goal in mind....Being a leader starts with authentic passion and leads to authentic confidence, and I could not be more glad that I had the opportunity to experience it during my freshman year at Regina."

Students who complete all required activities and earn the leadership badge will receive a lanyard pin and a sticker badge for

their iPads, and will have the award noted on their transcripts and announced during the Fall Honors Assembly. **Leia Spaniak '21** created the winning badge designs.

In her final project, Madison Maloney '21 reflected many of the student sentiments when she shared, "I can continue to improve my self confidence by continuing to put myself in leadership positions. The more I lead, the better I will become. The better I become, the more confidence that I will gain. Another way that I can improve my self confidence is to always stay positive and have faith in myself. I tend to doubt myself more than necessary in everyday life. By believing in myself, I can accomplish so much more." Students will build upon this confidence and continue their leadership development during the upcoming 2020-2021 school year with a focus on Joyful Learning. We look forward to seeing what they will accomplish!



LEADERSHIP SCHOLARS TAKE ACTION TO BETTER OUR PLANET

The Leadership Scholars Program continues to flourish and grow, with students examining what it means to be a leader, exploring their leadership styles, and leading events and initiatives across our school community. This year, the Leadership Scholars team of **Anne** Berg, Bridie Daly, Jackie Fuentes, Alicia Roque, and Jaydi Vasquez (all Class of 2021) launched their Panther Planet action project. With the vision to create a more environmentally conscious student body, the Panther Planet team developed an online platform to inform and inspire others to take action to better our planet. They launched an Instagram account, learned to run an engaging social media platform and tracked their metrics, led schoolwide activities, and collaborated with Leadership Scholars Caroline Seaman '20 and Lucie Sullivan '20 to promote the use of reusable tumblers and water bottles. These ambitious and results-oriented Leadership Scholars will expand their project this school year to design even more challenges and activities to inspire students, and will provide recommendations and resources for our school community to be more



environmentally friendly.

JUNIOR HIGH LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE PANEL

The annual Junior High Leadership Conference welcomes students from area elementary schools and is facilitated by student leaders from Regina Dominican and Notre Dame College Prep. The theme for the Fall 2019 conference was "Inspire. Act. Lead." Students heard from a panel of servant leaders who were inspired to take action and create positive change in the world. Panelists included Mona Purdy, founder of Share Your Soles; Gary Haeger, Chicago Bears Coat Drive; **Karina Kedo '11**, the STATIC Project; and Maria Ullmann, a road warrior for the Thirst Project.

FINDING HER PASSION

This summer, Leadership Scholar Madeleine Lunt '23 found her passion for political campaigning



while interning for congressional candidate Solomon Rajput (MI-12), a medical student at the University of Michigan. As a part of a nationwide, 400-person remote intern group, she phonebanked, fundraised, and created social media and graphic design content for the campaign.

The majority youth-led campaign gained considerable attention and momentum, but the candidate was ultimately defeated. However, he and many of the movement's members, including Maddie, will be starting a new organization—Done Waiting—that will use the infrastructure built during the campaign to support other progressive candidates nationwide.

Maddie was selected for a student position on the National Leadership Team at Done Waiting, where she will be continuing her work creating social media and graphic design content. Though Maddie was initially intimidated by the responsibility of the role, the members of Done Waiting were impressed with the skills she gained as a Leadership Scholar.

She explains, "Without my experience from Leadership Scholars, I definitely wouldn't have applied for a leadership position. But I remembered how Leadership Scholars taught me to be a leader and team player. I realized I can do this! Leadership Scholars helped me become a stronger individual leader and see how I can contribute as a leader in my community."

The Freshman Retreat introduces students to the Four Pillars of Dominican Life: Community, Prayer, Study, and Service, with a particular emphasis on the Pillar of Community. **Eleanor Schmerler-Rich '09**, one of the chaperones and the Freshman Class Moderator, states, "I believe that the retreat helped our freshman class bond more than ever . . . Being in a new environment evened the playing field when it came to getting to know new classmates and teachers. It was incredible to see how quickly the girls not only bonded with one another but also the Adrian Dominican Sisters." The Freshman Retreat also helped the students to recognize that they are part of a larger Dominican family. During the retreat, students had the opportunity to meet and hear from Adrian Dominican Sisters, many of whom had connections to Regina Dominican, and who helped the students to recognize that they were part of a shared tradition and to see the support of the Adrian Dominican Sisters for their school. Neighbors in Italy singing to one another from their balconies, Instagrammers recreating classic paintings with household items, chalk art adorning sidewalks proclaiming, "We are in this together!" 2020 has taught us one thing about art: creating something beautiful together is not merely a way to cope, but a process by which communities are built and strengthened.

This is especially true for students, who are young artists who are just beginning to discover their individual talents and creative footprint. At Regina, we were fortunate to have the majority of the fine arts season run as usual. We began with our Fall Musical. The Wizard of Oz. in November. Audience members were delighted by a strong quartet of seniors. two of whom, Nicolette Anichini '20 and Maya Cornejo '20, are continuing their Music Theatre studies in college. This solid opening was followed by a festive Christmas Concert in December to usher in the holiday season and showcase our choral, orchestra, and guitar students.

Granted, performances could not wow audiences without the tireless work of backstage operations—and at Regina, students are responsible for all aspects of production. Regina Girls are our stage managers, our scenic artists, our costumers, and our lighting and audio designers. Even the Fall Musical poster was a student original, designed by **Molly Fay '20**, who will be heading to Columbia College, Chicago, to study art in the fall.

Spring brought its own celebrations with the annual Orchesis Dance Concert and the Variety Show. However, the morning of the Variety Show, Regina Leadership made the decision to transition to remote learning for everyone's safety beginning the following Monday, and at first staff wondered whether the performance should be canceled. Thankfully, quick thinking saved the day: audience members were spaced out to maintain social distance, and careful blocking onstage ensured that the show could indeed go on. The performance was a celebration not only of our students' talents, but of Regina's ability to adapt to sudden change.

This was the last on-campus performance for the season, but such setbacks only encouraged our community to find new ways to create and share. Staff, students, and friends of Regina alike were treated to a one-of-a-kind Virtual Concert in May, a culmination of much preparation and collaboration. Students recorded themselves singing or playing an instrument, and Music Director Noah Pligge—the mastermind behind the very idea of a virtual concert—mixed them together to create choirs and bands that could exist only in the age of Zoom!

We've always felt fortunate to have a dedicated Fine Arts faculty that is able to bring out the best in our multifaceted student body, but this year only highlighted their critical role in our community. The arts at Regina have brought joy to us in both the best and the most challenging moments of the school year. We hope to emulate the students' and faculty's dedication and creativity as we push forward into another year that will surely be unconventional, but full of opportunities for thinking outside the box.

ANNUAL CONCERT ELEMENTS DAZZLES AUDIENCE



Regina's resident dance company,
Orchesis, enjoyed its most successful
season yet! Their March 2020 production,
Elements, featured a record 80 dancers and
introduced a never-before-seen immersive
art installation from the Visual Arts
Department. The performance drew in over
430 people from the Chicagoland area.

The week leading up to the concert was one of the highlights of the season for Director and Dance faculty Alison Valadez. The team spent over 70 hours at Regina in total, including tech and dress rehearsals as well as two performances.

In addition to this incredible effort of study and practice, students were involved in choreography, lighting, music, and prop production. *Elements* also featured a debut collaboration with Regina's 3D Design class, taught by Visual Arts faculty Sarah McNeely. The theme of the four elements—fire, water, earth, and air—was brought to life in the O'Shaughnessy Auditorium Foyer with images of flowing rivers, thundering clouds, and flickering flames.

"My goal was for the audience members to fully immerse themselves in the elements from the moment they walked through the doors," explains Ms. Valadez. "This was achieved thanks to Sarah McNeely's incredibly talented 3D Design class! This production would not have been the same without her hard work and talented Visual Art students!"

Being a part of Orchesis is more than the intensive study of dance: students pour their hearts and souls into telling stories with movement, and learn to master the art of dance both as single performers and as small parts of a whole, coordinated ensemble. For the 2020-21 season, Orchesis plans to continue moving full-steam ahead. In-person classes will be held with appropriate sanitation and social distancing guidelines observed, and should Regina transition back to virtual learning, live Zoom lessons will keep dancers on track with their curriculum.





Turning Hardship into a Huge Blessing

PATRICIA SIMON, RN '79

Born with a cleft lip and palate, Patricia underwent several surgeries as a child. Then, at age 50, an abscess in her palate led her to seek care at the UI Health Craniofacial Center. Surrounded in the waiting room by children with craniofacial differences, she wondered if there were any children's books for them. After finding that no books on craniofacial differences had been published for children in almost 20 years, she resolved to write one. Pat had never written a children's book before, but she knew there was a need to teach children to be kind to one another and accept differences. She wrote Smile with Simon, a story about a bird born with a gap in his beak and a girl with a cleft lip and how they became friends. The book was translated into Tagalog and was used at a Smile Train speech camp for children in the Philippines. Her second book, Simon and the Buddy Branch, is a story about inclusion and

accepting people's differences. This summer, Pat published her third and fourth books, Simon and the Bully and Simon & Patty Go to Camp.

Pat is very involved in the Children's Craniofacial Association, and is a member of their Speakers' Bureau. She was the keynote speaker at New York Presbyterian Hospital's 2018 Inaugural Cleft Lip and Palate Team Day. She is also on the Cleft Community Advisory Council for Smile Train. She is currently working with several nonprofit organizations to develop a standardized curriculum for educating children about accepting those with differences.



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Remembering SISTER ANN ROMAYNE FALLON, OP

REGINA DOMINICAN'S FIRST PRESIDENT

Mary Patricia Joan Fallon, who went by Joan until entering religious life, was born on August 29, 1928, in Detroit to Joseph and Anne (Gough) Fallon. She was educated by the Adrian Dominican Sisters at Precious Blood School. She attended nearby Immaculata High School, which was staffed by the Monroe Immaculate Heart of Mary Sisters. With the foundation given to her at home and the one laid by the Adrian Dominicans at Precious Blood, she felt called to become a sister at an early age. On June 23, 1946, two weeks after her high school graduation, she arrived in Adrian to begin her postulancy. Even at the young age of 17, she was "very certain that I had made the right choice," she wrote. "The call to religious life had come early and I was very happy." Joan took the name Ann after her mother and Romayne after a teacher who inspired her at Precious Blood.

S. Ann Romayne Fallon spent 56 years as an educator. Before coming to Regina Dominican, she taught at several schools in Florida and Illinois. In 1977, she was asked to become Principal of Regina Dominican. She served in this role until 1983, and then became the school's first President. She departed from Regina in 1988, when she was asked to become the Congregation's Treasurer. From there, she became the Associate Superintendent of the Archdiocesan school system of Detroit, as well as the Development Director and Director of Annual Giving for Dominican High School and Academy in Detroit. She returned to Regina as Interim President from 2000 to 2002, and then served as the Interim Director of the Weber Center in Adrian, Michigan. At almost 78 years of age, she and several other Sisters undertook ministries in Alaska at the request of the Archbishop of Anchorage. When she left Alaska after five years, writer Effie Caldarola described her as having helped "change the face of Catholic school education in the Archdiocese of Anchorage."

S. Ann died at the Dominican Life Center on October 6, 2019, at age 91 and in her seventy-second year as an Adrian Dominican Sister. She is sorely missed by the Regina Dominican community and will always have a special place in Regina's history.

"S. Ann was a woman of pure wisdom who was very creative and always open to new ideas. These traits made her an inspirational model to our girls. She was also an ambassador of Regina Dominican as she gathered pastors and principals on a regular basis for breakfast at Regina to promote the wonderful mission of the school. She was beloved by many and is truly missed."
