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### Dr. Kassie Porreca: Year in Review

Now that she has completed her first full year as Principal at Regina Dominican, we sat down with Dr. Kassie Porreca to ask her five fast questions.

#### What three words best sum up the past '18-'19 academic year and why?

**Energizing.** When I interviewed for this position, I got a taste of the passion people have for the school's mission, but only after I joined Regina Dominican did I understand the true depth of love and commitment. It is absolutely energizing.

**Active.** Not a week goes by that we don't have an exciting event, uplifting liturgy, or engaging and innovative class instruction.

**Inspiring.** Every aspect of this school inspires me: our students' energy and joy in learning, the dedication of our faculty and staff, the interest and commitment of our parents, and the loyal connection of our alumnae who continue to carry our message around the world.

#### What was your favorite memory of this past year?

I have two. First and foremost is Ring Day Mass in December, a tradition that is special to the Regina community. When a student puts on her graduation gown for the first time, you see the young woman's demeanor change as she realizes the significant changes in store for her life in the months ahead.

My second favorite memory was chaperoning the 2019 National History Day finalists to College Park, Maryland, to compete in June. The students were so talented and such strong competitors. Even more so they were sportswomen; when they did not advance further in the contest they fully embraced the experience of being at the national competition, participating in every

activity and opportunity to learn all they could about our nation's history and democracy. We rounded out our trip by visiting nearby Washington, D.C., participating in a special program at the Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture, and visiting Capitol Hill. They made me so proud to be this great school's principal.

#### What annual RDHS event are you most looking forward to this coming year?

Now that we have our own athletic fields, I am excited to see us grow our tailgate culture as Panthers on the Property becomes a regular tradition.

#### **Based on your experience this** past year, what do you think most differentiates Regina Dominican from other schools?

# THE SURPRISING VALUE OF CLASS REUNIONS

The surprising thing about class reunions is that, while in most instances the excitement and enjoyment come from the renewal of old friendships, many times the joy stems from actually meeting or talking to a "classmate" for the very first time. Sounds crazy, doesn't it? But, back in 1961 when the Class of 1965 entered Regina as a freshman class of 350 girls, we didn't get to know everyone. This was due in part to the wide geographic base from which our classmates traveled to attend Regina, and also to the school's academic tracking schedule that kept us moving from class to class with the same 35 girls all day long. Apart from time spent in homeroom and extracurricular activities, it could be challenging to get to know other students.

But fast forward 50 years, and it is easy to see that we all emerged with a similar set of values, based on a Catholic, Dominican philosophy of education intent on "empowering women" decades before that term became an iconic phrase of the 21st century. From day one, we were given the confidence to believe in ourselves and to do meaningful things with our lives.

This became evident to my alumnae group in 2015 as we prepared for our 50th Class

Reunion. Those of us who were part of the Golden Anniversary Celebration Planning Committee came into town a day early and stayed overnight at a local hotel to finalize plans for the next day. Late that night the sight of the hotel hallway, doors open to all our rooms, was nostalgically reminiscent of college nights in the dorm where students would bounce from room to room, talking about the meaning of life deep into the morning hours. So many years later, as "women of a certain age," we enjoyed this same atmosphere of freedom and sharing, and it was the beginning of a new chapter in our Regina lives.

In one of these late-night chat sessions, Julie Everhart David made this proposal:

"In two years, when we all turn 70, let's go to Las Vegas to celebrate! If enough of you are interested in going, I will take the lead and arrange the trip."

This was a NO-BRAINER! Hands flew up in support of a great idea and in appreciation of Julie's initiative. And so it began.

Now, four years after that reunion, our group of 13 women has visited Las Vegas, New Orleans, and Nashville. Next spring, we

are headed to Savannah for sunshine and relaxation. We also get together for lunch a few times a year, and we enjoy a refreshing pontoon boat ride on the Milwaukee River each summer, thanks to our Captain, Susan Lambert Casper. While these activities have provided us with remarkable venues and hours of fun, the highlight of our travels together has clearly been the camaraderie we've developed. Our lives are in many ways similar, and in many ways very different. Sharing these differences is both interesting and inspiring. We are a mutually supportive group of alums who credit our education at Regina with making us the women we are today.

As the fall season of class reunions draws near, I urge you to do two things:

- Attend your class reunion and bring a friend; make it an important event for you as a person.
- 2) Financially support your alma mater: the world needs Regina grads more than ever!

# REGINA DOMINICAN ADVANCES IN NATIONAL HISTORY DAY CONTEST

Regina Dominican has a proud record of significant accomplishments in the National History Day Contest, and in 2019 advanced to the Finals once again. The competition encourages more than half a million students around the world to conduct historical research on a topic of their choice. Students enter these projects at the local level—which for our students is at the Chicago Metro History Fair—with top entrants competing in the national finals at the University of Maryland in College Park.

Over the past 20 years, approximately 435 Regina Dominican students have participated in the contest, with many advancing to the city-wide competition and ultimately representing the State of Illinois delegation at the national competition. Each state can send only two entries from each of the ten categories to the nationals, and Regina Dominican made that short list in 2008, 2010, 2012, and now 2019.

This year, **Anne Berg '21** competed with her entry in the Documentary category, titled *The WPA School Mural Project: A Missed Educational Opportunity*. The film explores the impact and contribution of the WPA (Works Progress Administration) Art project and the fact that so few schools leveraged the works (which they housed and do still today) as a tool to teach students about that era and the impact the initiative had on our nation's culture and growth.

Sophomores Grace Langfels '21, Kayla Smith '21, Maggie Stutz '21, and Mia Touhy '21 also presented at the National History Day Contest; their entry was in the Performance category titled The Our Lady of the Angels School Fire: The Fire That Sparked the Improvement of Fire Codes. Their presentation was a re-enactment detailing the 1958 tragedy: how the day unfolded, what contributed to the fire's rapid spread, why students were

unable to escape, and how this fire ultimately effected change in fire code regulations.

Although our students proudly represented Regina with strong entries, they were not on the final dais—but that does not stop Regina girls! Chaperoned by school Principal Dr. Kassie Porreca, following the competition the team took the opportunity to explore our nation's capital and were warmly welcomed by the senior U.S. Senator from Illinois, Dick Durbin.

# Excelente Profesor

"I strongly believe that Regina's smaller class sizes play a vital role in giving our students the confidence to spread their wings and ask questions that will deepen their understanding of the topic at hand," commented Spanish teacher Paula Duran. Now in her seventh year at Regina Dominican, Paula is a beloved teacher. Her fun-loving spirit spurs the girls to do their best, which may be why so many of her students are so interested in pursuing the language after their high school vears.

But Paula adds another perspective. She attributes these achievements to the fact that Regina's World Languages Department is constantly refining its teaching methods based on current research. "We implement high-leverage, high-impact teaching practices based on research that looks at how a person learns a new language. Studies indicate—and Regina students *prove*—that this approach results in better student performance on standardized tests like the AP Spanish Language and Culture Exam or the National Spanish Exam."

This past summer Paula dedicated several weeks to better prepare her students for success. First, she participated as an AP Reader in Cincinnati where she scored exams from students of AP Spanish Language & Culture. From there, she and her family headed to Spain and Portugal

to explore the history and culture. This coming spring, she will be moderating a similar trip open to all Regina Dominican students.

"We'll be visiting major capitals—Madrid, Paris, and Rome. I want our students to appreciate the cultural and linguistic contrasts between them. We will also be walking in the footsteps of our beloved patron saint, Catherine of Siena," she explained. But Paula also noted the benefits of the tour that go beyond the personal. "This tour will expand students' worldview as they grow through language and cultural immersion, and there is a confidence that comes with that." Then, with a wink to the frustrations that can sometimes come with travel (delayed flights, rainy days, etc.), she adds, "and let's not forget the importance of learning about flexibility!"

# Taking Action to Do Good

The Leadership Scholars program is a voluntary, application-based program for leadership development that helps students build skills in the core competency areas of authentic self-confidence, joyful learning, compelling communication, and global citizenship. When Jennifer Herrington, the new director of the Leadership Institute, joined RDHS in October, she met with students and key stakeholders to learn about the program's past successes. From there she refined the framework to put in a regimen that would help students specifically build the skills and abilities necessary to best prepare them for success in their post-secondary education, the workplace, and beyond.

As a result, the Leadership Scholars program was redesigned to provide multiple, personalized opportunities for students to engage in inquiry, project-based learning, and leadership activities. "My goal is for students to build leadership skills that will serve them well beyond their years at Regina Dominican," explained Jennifer. "From research-based projects and grassroots initiatives, to campaigns that have global impact, students are able to engage in a series of activities and experiences that help them develop as a leader and acquire new skills to add to their leadership toolkit."

New for 2019-2020, the Institute will be launching a badging program. Each year will focus on a different quadrant of the leadership shield. This year the badging theme is Authentic Self-Confidence. Students will be able to earn credit toward this badge through participation in leadership development workshops, completion of skills-based activities, engaging as a leader in the RDHS community, and the creation of a culminating project.

"Everyone is a leader in a different way, and one size does not fit all," she explained. "With support from the Leadership Institute, the Regina Dominican girl has multiple opportunities for leadership development and can dedicate herself to learning, experiencing, and exploring what it means to be an everyday leader."

# Student Project

Leadership Institute Scholar **Lucie Sullivan '20** (shown at right) is passionate about stemming the increasing amount of single-use plastic and its impact on the environment. "Regina is a place that has always tried to improve the world from multiple perspectives. Single-use plastic has a big impact on the environment and marine wildlife. It will continue to develop into larger issues if we do not take action now. We all have one world to share, and Regina teaches and prepares us to change the world from the inside out." In her third year of the Leadership Institute program, Lucie leveraged this opportunity to work with a team of students to lead an initiative aimed at reducing single-use plastic in our community.

Lucie and her team of Riley McInerney '20, Caroline Seaman '20, and Alexandra

Sweilem '19 led an action project during second semester to reduce single-use plastic, beginning with reusable straws. The team of Leadership Scholars created an awareness campaign and distributed almost 200 reusable straws throughout the RDHS community! Through a follow-up initiative, students, faculty, and staff were

encouraged to share pictures using their straws.

Other Leadership Scholars' projects included disability awareness and efforts to create a more inclusive community as well as a student voice platform to discuss current issues and events. All returning Leadership Scholars have big plans to continue and expand their leadership projects and collaborate with others across our community to achieve even greater results.







# Fine Arts FOR THE AUTHENTIC AND UNAFRAID!



In the fall of 2018, Music Director Noah Pligge joined Regina Dominican, and he quickly became a favorite among the students. He came to us with a strong track record of choosing and directing plays and performances that specifically feature roles that showcase the talents of younger performers. Now, as he heads into his second year here, we asked him to sum up the past year and his plans ahead:

### Q: What three words best describe the typical Regina Dominican Fine Arts student?

A: That's easy—connected, authentic, and unafraid!

Think about the kind of music that a student chooses to listen to—typically it is not opera or Broadway musicals. Today's popular music features voices that speak to life experience and lessons learned, and our Regina students do the same. They come to class, they learn the music, and then they let their own voice tell the story. As a teacher, that is so gratifying to see—and hear!

### Q: What is your favorite memory from the 2018-2019 academic year?

A: My favorite memory from this past year would have to be conducting the Chorale and Orchestra Spring Concert performance of "Go the Distance" from Hercules. When I chose the music of Disney as our theme, I was pleased to see that the students were enthused—it was my first major decision as Music Director so I wanted to ensure they'd be engaged. Then, at the concert when that song was performed, the students' energy was palpable! Each girl put on her most robust performance and the audience could feel their vitality.

#### Q: What is your vision for the Music Department?

A: High school is a perfect time to try out new things, so I want the Music Department to be a place where students can come to express themselves artistically even if they feel they don't have any musical abilities. I would love to see every student choose to take a music class.

#### Q: What is ahead for the 2019-2020 school year?

**A:** I have a few tricks up my sleeve for the Music Department, so stay tuned!

#### **TRACK & FIELD**

"I help clients get out stories about their companies, products, and employees. We tell those stories through traditional and social media, so I have brought all those skills to my role at Regina."

Now as Chair, she narrows her focus.

"As Board Chair, I want to ensure that Regina continues to foster academic excellence and that families are aware of our wonderfully welcoming environment. We'll continue to provide personalized education and to show students that their options and opportunities are endless," she explains. "Further, I see the opportunity to put an expanded focus on those initiatives that have brought us success in the most recent decade—especially STEM programs, and a rich, accessible offering of arts and athletics."

In light of the 2018-2019 anniversary year, Maura considers the weight of the school's legacy. "Regina celebrated its 60th anniversary—what an incredible milestone! Our obligation is to those who came before us and to those who will enter these doors in the years

ahead, and I take that responsibility quite seriously. In an effort to maintain our legacy of strong academics and to be responsive to the students of tomorrow, we have plans to redevelop the campus—to create an optimized learning environment that leverages technology and allows us to continue to provide an enriching educational experience for our students."

# REGINA WELCOMES S. Katherine Frazier, O.P.

This summer we had an opportunity to sit down with Regina Dominican's Director of Mission Integration, S. Katherine Frazier. The 2018-2019 school year was her first at Regina and she had much to share.



# What three words best sum up the past '18-'19 academic year and why?

**New.** My first word is "new" because I was new to Regina Dominican last year, and I learned a lot of new things in my first year and met so many new people! I'm also excited because, even though I helped to say goodbye to the Class of 2019, I'm looking forward to getting to know the Class of 2023.

**Tradition.** When I came to Regina, I was amazed by the rich traditions at the high school, whether Ring Day or Gnimocemoh. I'm also aware that Regina has traditions that come from the Adrian Dominican Sisters who sponsor RDHS, and I'm so grateful to be a link to this tradition for the school.

**Hope.** I don't think it's possible to talk about Regina Dominican without talking about our amazing students. I'm constantly amazed by everything that they accomplish and do, and I'm even more amazed by the women they are becoming. Knowing our students gives me so much hope for the future. I know

that we have so many wonderful future leaders at Regina, and I can't wait for the rest of the world to get to know them as well.

### What was your favorite memory of this past school year?

During Dominican Week the school held a St. Catherine of Siena Mass, and our student preachers, known as our Dominican Preachers, put on a skit about the saints. They were so excited to share the stories of the Dominican saints with their fellow students—they had a script and costumes! I loved their enthusiasm.

# This past year the theme was "Learn More, Love More." How did you see that brought to life with the students?

I really enjoyed our Lenten practice of making friendship bracelets, where students were invited to learn more and love more about people in their lives, including God, friends, and family. I especially appreciated that the Dominican Preachers gave suggestions for living out these invitations during Lent.

#### What impact do you think the Dominican mission has on graduates as they leave Regina Dominican?

I clearly see the Dominican Pillars of study and community alive and well in the women who graduate from Regina. I have seen some of our graduates bring with them curiosity about the world and a desire to learn for the rest of their lives. I have also seen and heard so many stories about the amazing community fostered at Regina Dominican. So many women have told me about the lifelong friends that they made while attending RDHS.

# What is your vision for the future of the school/students as it relates to mission integration?

My vision for students and all members of the Regina community is that they will have a great love for being part of a school in the Dominican Tradition.

I hope that Students and other members of the RDHS community will be able to say why the Four Pillars of Dominican Life—Prayer, Study, Community, and Service—are part of their lives, and how they learned these values at Regina Dominican.

# Learn More, Love More

The Campus Ministry 2018-2019 theme was "Learn More, Love More," and according to Lisa Boris, Campus Minister, it was enthusiastically embraced by students. "I have to say that theme drove to the very core of what and who we are as a Dominican school. It provided an opportunity for students to learn about different cultures, to identify injustices in the world, and to exercise what they can do to address the issues."

The theme was carried out in a series of student-led initiatives including the highly successful Thanksgiving food drive, which benefitted from some lighthearted sportsmanship as classes competed against one another to see which could gather the most donations.

Activities even extended to everyday kindnesses, from praying for a friend's special intentions, to simply offering a sweet treat to a classmate who was having a stressful day.

Campus Ministry also oversees the retreat for each class. "Each year the retreats take on one of the Four Pillars of Dominican life: Freshmen learn about the importance of community; Sophomores focus on service; Juniors engage in study; and Seniors look at the role of prayer and how it can put love

into action," Lisa explained.

"What inspired me the most was seeing our Dominican Preachers take the initiative and have fun living their faith," she beamed. "At the St. Catherine of Siena feast day Mass, they put on a skit in which each girl portrayed a different saint and shared what role that saint played in religious history."

Students new to Regina Dominican are often delighted to learn they can serve as Dominican Preachers and demonstrate their faith to their peers. To participate, students can apply in March for the following school year. There is an interview and a written application, which asks the student about her faith and its role in her life (i.e. participation in church groups, service projects, etc.). Currently we have 13 Preachers, with hopes of having that number increase annually.

#### DR. CAINE'S HEART OF INCLUSION

Our very own Director of Student Services, Dr. Patricia Caine, was honored by the Archdiocese of Chicago in May with a "Heart of the School Award" in the Heart of Inclusion category. Of the 500 educators nominated, fewer than 5% were chosen to be honored. Dr. Caine was recognized for creating a warm, welcoming atmosphere for all students. 

She is finishing up work on a novel, *Watching Men Dance*, and her book *Skywriting: A Guided Journal to Help You Soar!* will be released in September of 2019 by Flint Hills Publishing and will be available on Amazon. She has received numerous awards and honors from the Illinois and American Library Associations. She is the recipient of the Public Humanities Award from the Illinois Humanities Council; the Friend of Illinois Community College Libraries; Alumnus of the Year from the University of Illinois Graduate School of Library and Information Science; and a Honorable Service Medal from the US Army. Bridget currently serves as the chair of the Memorial Medical Foundation.

In 1989, after earning a Ph.D. in clinical health from Northwestern University Medical School, Madeline founded PsycHealth, a managed behavioral healthcare organization, which she managed for nearly thirty years. Madeleine loved the work and takes great pride in the innovative programs they offered to their patients. In 2018, the organization was acquired, and Madeleine decided it was time to take on a new adventure. Why not a record label?



**WakeUp! Music Group** founded by "Pepper" Gomez, a.k.a. Madeleine, is a record label dedicated to providing artists with a platform to express their talent and bring their creativity to the next level. But wait, how does a clinical psychologist decide to go into the record business? Madeleine has always loved to sing. She comes from a musical family where, she says, her brother was the talented one. Her first break in the industry came in the early 80s when she sang backup Spanish vocals for one of her brother's bands. In an interview with *lifebeyondmusic* she said, "Many people think that getting old means that it is time to slow down and retire, but I think that the model is the exact opposite. You need to get busy, stay busy, and stay active. It gives you the charge and energy to handle anything that life throws at you and as you may know, life can throw anything at you at any time."

When asked about her Regina days, she remembers that students were encouraged to be their best selves and they embraced opportunities they may not have considered in a co-ed environment. 



## Mindful Medicine

**GRAINNE MCKEOWN '94** 



In 2008, after earning a master's degree from The Seattle Institute of Oriental Medicine, Grainne moved to Bali and later Nepal to work as an acupuncturist in local clinics. Her time in Indonesia and South Asia provided her with experience in a wide range of healthcare settings. She worked in a midwifery clinic providing prenatal, delivery, and postnatal care, and while in Nepal, she treated patients with ailments ranging from diabetes and asthma to typhoid and cerebral palsy. She returned to Chicago a year later to start her own practice as a Licensed Acupuncturist and Herbal Medicine Practitioner.

Today, Grainne still runs a successful practice in Lincoln Park. She uses needles, herbal remedies, meditation, bodywork, and advice on lifestyle changes to support optimum health for her patients. In 2016, she was named *Chicago Magazine's* Best Acupuncturist in Chicago.

A great deal has changed since Grainne first started her practice. In a recent interview, Grainne recalls how at one time acupuncture was equated with witchcraft and doctors referred to it as "something that couldn't hurt but..." Now she often sees patients coming to her with referrals from their primary care doctors. She regularly treats clients for chronic pain, stress, stomach problems, and infertility. According to Grainne, acupuncture's effectiveness at relieving pregnancy nausea is what really brought it into mainstream medicine. In fact, today many reproductive specialists and gynecologists have an acupuncturist in-office. Another change to her practice is the increase in patients seeking acupuncture instead of opioids as a pain treatment with no side effects.

Aside from running a successful practice, Grainne is also the founder of Mindful Medicine Worldwide, a nonprofit organization that seeks to bring long-term integrative health care to people of developing areas, by establishing and operating integrative healthcare clinics. Currently, Mindful Medicine operates two acupuncture clinics in Nepal.

Grainne lives in Chicago with her son Diarmuid. Grainne was the recipient of the Regina Alumna Medal in 2012.


### From 701 Locust to the Hill
