Dear Alumnae,

PARENTS, GUARDIANS, AND FRIENDS,

How are you?

There is so much weight in that question today. How are you doing physically, emotionally, mentally? Do your pants still fit? Mine don't. It has been a year that feels like a decade, but we are doing great!

Regina Dominican knocked it out of the park this past year. We successfully and safely opened our campus for our entire student body 5 days a week starting in mid-August of 2020 through the rest of the year with the exception of a few weeks of eLearning over the holidays. We are the only high school in the region to have done so. We had zero spread of COVID-19 on our campus. We prioritized academics and safety above all else, and it worked. The Class of 2021 earned offers of over \$14.5M in scholarship money and increased their average ACT scores even though their junior year was violently interrupted by the pandemic the prior year.

This type of success does not come easy, but it was possible because of the unwavering commitment of our hardworking faculty, staff, students and parents. Not only did we outperform every school in the area from an engagement and attendance perspective but we also still managed to keep our eyes on the prize. Work on our strategic plan was steady and focused with tremendous efforts by our faculty and staff on their professional development journeys, creating and delivering world-class college prep curriculum. Our community at large worked through uncomfortable truths of racism and bias by finding ways to combat it with love, compassion, understanding and unity like only a Dominican school can. We ended the year with a balanced budget and slight increase in our scholarship endowments as well as having record student and parent satisfaction!

Even with all of this success, we know there is much more to do. The realities of operating a private Catholic school in this modern world have not become any easier after these difficult 18 months. Many families are still reeling from the financial impacts of the pandemic, fewer people identify as Catholic in the Chicago area and the costs of running a high quality college prep high school is outpacing wage growth.

We will meet these challenges with our new strategic plan and know it will take strength of mind, body and spirit to accomplish. Part of that strategic plan includes re-envisioning our beloved campus. Alumna and world renowned architect, Carol Ross Barney '66 is working on a student-centered campus plan that leverages technology and matches the fabulous culture and pedagogy of RDHS. This plan is about more than a new building—it's a chance to right-size our space in a way that better supports our curriculum and our commitment to providing girls with an individualized education. The design process included the input of faculty, staff, students, parents, alumnae, board members, and the Adrian Dominican Sisters. Please enjoy a sneak peek at the plans in the pages that follow.

This has been a difficult time for everyone. If you ever get discouraged and concerned for our future as a nation or the world while watching the news, I have the antidote for you. See what our alumnae like Carol Ross Barney are doing, see what our students are doing, come to campus for a visit. They are learning every day how to be a part of the solution to big problems. They are learning to find joy no matter how bleak the world may seem around them. They are learning to lead and be the voice for positive



change in the world. They are learning that they can have respectful dialogue with people of differing opinions and still be friends. All of this is possible because of generous donors like you. I hope you see and feel the power of this great work in the stories that follow. We are very grateful for your support and generosity, and we rlook forward to partnering with you for another successful year building the future of Regina Dominican!

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DR. KASSIE PORRECA REFLECTS:

The Year in Review

In a year when the world was turned upside down and that contained so many struggles, we had many accomplishments to be proud of here at Regina Dominican High School. The entire summer of 2020 was spent meeting with our campus reopening advisory group and keeping up to date on all the latest in COVID-19 precautions and protocols in order to build our school reopening plan and communicate it to all our parents, students, and staff.

The team effort involved everyone, and we were able to open school in person, for one hundred percent of our student body, as scheduled in August 2020—a feat that no other school, public or private, in our area was able to accomplish. We recruited a volunteer corps of parents and alumnae who worked every day to help screen and temperature check every student as they entered the building in the morning; we installed safety equipment and signage; we created new procedures for cleaning and sanitizing our environment throughout the school day; and, of course, we all wore masks all day long and maintained physical distancing at all times. We relocated classes into larger areas and spread out desks so that everyone was six feet apart.

As the new year went on, we kept a close eve on local COVID-19 rates. When students became exposed or tested positive, we developed a successful contact tracing and quarantine policy resulting in never having a single case of transmission here in school. We were proud of how our families and staff came together and lived up to our "Panther Pledge" to keep everybody in our community safe and healthy. Through the efforts of our Nurse Marti Barthel and community partners, we were able to offer vaccines for our entire staff early in February, and then to our students as soon as the vaccine was approved for them in May. Our vaccine clinics were a real accomplishment. Securing vaccines for our staff when appointments were still hard to come by so that they could feel protected from exposure to the virus while coming to

school every day made a big difference for our community. More than a few people had tears of joy, excitement, and relief in their eyes as they got their shot.

We worked hard to maintain as much normalcy as we could and to keep up with our Regina Dominican traditions all throughout the year. Masses were held outside when the weather allowed, and via Zoom when it did not. Gnimocemoh lived on with spirit days and activities that were modified to be COVID-safe. We erected tents on the athletic field to provide outdoor classroom and eating spaces,



and we learned to love enjoying our campus and fresh air. Ring Day Mass was moved up from December to October, and held outside. Convocation, commencement, and prom were all hosted outside, and by the time we ended school for the year, Illinois was just days away from full reopening. Our spirits were lifted by that joyful development.

Our staff made the immediate shift last March into remote learning, adapting to new methods of teaching and connecting with students, and that spirit of creativity and a "can-do" attitude persisted all throughout the 2020-2021 school year. Students who were quarantined or whose parents requested remote learning attended classes while the rest of the class was in-person. Regina teachers always

put students' needs first, as they helped each other innovate the best ways to maintain our challenging curriculum throughout the pandemic. Our counselors supported students and their families through the emotional turmoil of living through this time of uncertainty, while many of them lost friends and family members to COVID-19 throughout the year.

I'm most proud of our students. Regina girls inspired me every day of this past year. Behind those masks, their smiles were still there, and their spirit was indomitable. Our students supported each other and looked out for one another all year long. Spontaneous acts of kindness sprang up: an anonymous "Regina Positivity" Instagram account posted uplifting quotes and images, and the Student Council and class leadership boards launched many projects to lift spirits, such as cooking contests and Netflix viewing parties. Our Regina Dominican students were happy and grateful that they alone among their peers were able to come to school in person every day with their whole school, and they showed it. They were even cheerful when they lined up every morning to be screened and happily adapted to wearing a mask at all times.

Through it all, we all kept an eye on each other, prayed for each other, and stood by each other. Many times throughout the year, students and staff stated, "I could not imagine getting through this pandemic without the Regina Dominican community's support."

Now we are looking ahead to the new school year. Believing that the worst is behind us, we are excited about being able to bring back the traditions that we missed, like gathering together as an entire school for our weekly Morning Meeting, all-school Mass in the auditorium, pep rallies, and bleachers filled with spectators during athletic events. We know that some precautions will certainly remain in place, but we know that our resilient student body and staff will take whatever comes in stride, and that together, we are a community that is committed to each other.

REGINA GIRLS LEAD & GO

The Regina Dominican Leadership Institute prepares every Regina Girl to lead and make an impact. It encourages girls to think globally and challenge themselves to improve their global citizenship through service, outreach, and education. In a time where there have been numerous barriers that impact global outreach, Regina Dominican students have proved that even virtually, they can make an impact globally.

The United Nations Commission on the Status of Women is dedicated to the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of women. The 65th session met this March. The Working Group on Girls is a partner of United Nations Women and UNICEF to support the legal and human rights of girls everywhere. On March 16, these groups hosted international conversation circles for girls from around the world to share ideas and connect with each other. The aim of the conversation circles was to amplify the voices of girls, increase girls' visibility as essential to Generation Equality, and encourage girls' participation and leadership in the political process at the local, national, and global level. Each conversation circle had its own topic ranging from peace and security to economic justice and climate, and Regina students shined as leaders in this event.

S. Durstyn Farnan, OP is the UN Representative for the Dominican Leadership Conference that is part of the Dominican Sisters Conference. S. Durstyn invited Regina to participate in these events and we embraced the opportunity! Gabi Kerrigan '23 was part of an international group of girl delegates that created the Official United Nations Statement on the Girl that was delivered to the United Nations as part of this event. Kirka Kallioras '22 and Maeve Newton '21 were trained to be conversation circle facilitators and led international circles on technology and innovation for gender equality, and feminist movements, and leadership. Gabi, Sophia Rhoda Akosah '23, Rebeca Marqueda '23, and Julia Cerimele '24 were all active participants in the circles. Each student was profoundly impacted and inspired by the experience.

This was an amazing opportunity that I will carry with me for a long time. I was able to connect with a girl who started an organization in India to normalize and destigmatize feminine hygiene products. We were able to exchange contact information, and I plan on starting a chapter of her organization here at Regina. 77 -REBECA MARQUEDA '23

Then, in June, Rhoda and Julia joined a group of girl-advocates and activists from around the world that drafted a Statement on the Girl as part of the Generation Equality Forum in Paris. The letter calls for the involvement of girls in the decision-making, goal-drafting, and implementation processes at all levels of government and to highlight the reforms they want to see in the world in the next five years. As the letter stated, "Girls bear the double burden of gender and age discrimination, and it is essential for leaders and relevant actors to acknowledge our unique voices and equip us to speak for ourselves. We are the future that begins today, and we want to have a part in creating a more equal and sustainable world for ourselves." Rhoda also created a video that was shared with the delegates!

Regina students continue to seek opportunities to participate in global discussions and create positive impact. This summer, Latrisha Taylor '23 is participating in the Global Youth Ambassadors Leadership Summit, a joint program of Chicago Sister Cities International and the University of Illinois at Chicago. This leadership program is designed to build the next generation of global leaders through citizen diplomacy and advocacy. It is open to teenage girls, ages 14-16, from Chicago and its 29 international sister cities. For her final project, Latrisha worked with peers from Chicago, Prague, Toronto, and Gothenburg to analyze data and create a gender equity scorecard for each of their cities on the topic of girls' mental health.

Additionally, a team of Leadership Scholars comprised of Emily Chavez '22, Kirka Kallioras '22, Tristen Norman '22, and Catherine Patti '22 are are using the UN Working Group on Girls toolkit develop their capstone projects, which will culminate in leading their own conversation circles and facilitating these important discussions between Regina students and girls from selected schools around the world. LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE HIGHLIGHTS

LEADERSHIP SCHOLARS

Leadership Scholars from the Class of 2021 completed their leadership action projects. The Regina Reads team organized a book donation drive and hosted a book fair to distribute over a thousand books to Jamieson Elementary students to prevent the summer reading slide. The Panther Packages team assembled and delivered thoughtful care packages filled with toiletries and hygiene items to the Primo



Center that serves women and children in transition. Finally, the Panther Planet team developed a series of campaigns to create a more environmentally conscious student body who actively participates in actions that will better the planet. These Leadership Scholars had a tremendous impact on the community!


JOYFUL LEARNING BADGE

Research shows that 7 in 10 girls believe they are not good enough or do not measure up in some way and 74% of girls say they are under pressure to please everyone. With these stats in mind, this year's Joyful Learning badge, recognized for a second year with a generous grant from the W.P. and H.B White Foundation, focused on helping students find joy in the journey, take risks, overcome failure, and embrace imperfection. All students participated in activities to practice a growth mindset, discover our learning strengths, celebrate our bravery, and practice joyful learning behaviors. And, almost half of all students went the extra mile to earn their badge by attending hands-on morning workshops and completing a final project that challenged them to learn a new skill and reflect on the process.

NEW CONNECTIONS

New partnerships were established with the Nova Network, an organization uniting women's college grads, and the Women's Exchange in Winnetka that encourages intergenerational connections, learning, and relationship building. The Nova Network hosted a virtual panel for Regina's students and parents to discover more about women's colleges. And, in May, Regina National Art Honors Society students and members of the Women's Exchange attended an interactive workshop to learn about Gee's Bend quilts, discuss commonalities in our own experiences, and create our own quilt!















THE CLASS OF 2021

The Regina Dominican Class of 2021 started the school year in-person and ended their four years at Regina Dominican with the ultimate outdoor commencement ceremony! In year where traditions had to be transformed, our graduation traditions made a comeback and remained the same—we held an in-person Alumnae Induction, Convocation and Commencement. After the athletic field on campus was transformed into the ultimate celebration location. Regina Dominican seniors were able to celebrate with all of the pomp and circumstance that comes with the honor of graduating. The celebration began with the Alumnae Induction held on Friday, May 21, where Regina Dominican alums Paula Acuna '08 and English teacher Annie Tully '92 emphasized the importance of their Regina Dominican roots and that 701 Locust Road will always be home no matter where life's adventures take you.

The celebration continued on Friday, May 28, 2021 with Convocation, a long-standing Regina Dominican tradition where the community celebrated the

academic, athletic, philanthropic, and personal achievements of the Class of 2021. Among those awards recognized were our Medalists and Principal's Award Winner (see page 5), as well as our Athlete of the Year Laura Strenk '21 and our Senior School Spirit Award recipient Abigail Farmer '21.

While some high schools in the Chicagoland area rented out larger spaces to accommodate graduation or limited in-person attendance, Regina Dominican transformed the athletic field to host the Class of 2021 Baccalaureate and Commencement Ceremony on Saturday, May 29, 2021. With family, friends, faculty, staff and Board Members filling the seats, 73 Regina Dominican Seniors were honored during their Commencement Mass led by Father Peter Wojcik, followed by the conferring of diplomas. This year's Regina Dominican Alumnae Medalist was Bridget Geraghty '03, and Senior Anne Berg represented the Class of 2021 as she gave the graduation address. Anne painted a wonderfully vibrant and beautiful picture of the Class of 2021 and their last four years at Regina Dominican. She stated "Wherever we may go, we will carry with us the confidence, knowledge, and community that we gained here. The Crown, the Star, and the Book will always be our guideposts. So as you move forward to college, be confident in who you are, and keep your head held high. You are more capable than you know." Senior members of the Regina Dominican Chorale serenaded attendees and graduates with a beautiful rendition of "Rise Up" by Andra Day, proving once again that Regina Girls are bold, resilient and strong.

What could be a more perfect ending to such a celebration? Prom, of course! The Senior Class Leadership Board and Senior Advisors transformed the athletic field into the perfect Midsummer's Night Dream! The new graduates danced the night away under the stars at the most magical prom yet! From food trucks to crowning the Prom Queen, the Class of 2021 was able to celebrate the end of their high school years together joyously and safely.

FINE ARTS AT REGINA DOMINICAN

In a year where the sounds of Broadway were silenced and concerts became a thing of the past, the Regina Dominican Fine Arts Department took an unexpected year and created a masterpiece of beauty, talent and creativity. From virtual concerts and interactive art galleries to hosting two on-campus viewings of the Orchesis Dance production Metropolis and the Spring Musical "We're All In This Together: Regina The Musical," Noah Pligge (Theater/Music), Alison Valadez (Dance) and Sarah McNeely (Art) guided our students through an incredible year!

Regina Dominican's first ever Virtual Art Show debuted on January 14, 2021 and ran through Sunday, January 24, 2021. The show featured drawings, paintings, digital prints, mixed media and more from 42 students. The second virtual showcase took place from the second week of June to the end of the month. Participants were able to virtually navigate a diverse exhibit of visual masterpieces from the comforts of home.

With the Fall musical put on pause during the first semester, Noah Pligge decided to get creative and bring the stage to the big screen by writing and filming the Spring Musical "We're All In This Together: Regina The Musical." The premise of the musical was that it was filmed in a documentary style depicting what it is like for the students to put on a show during this pandemic. The songs are based on personal stories of certain students that are highlighted throughout in a musical revue style. The Musical shows what it is like to be a Regina Arts student. Noah Pligge explains the inspiration behind the show: "People only ever get to see the finished product of a show. Since I knew everything needed to be recorded separately, I thought it

would be fun to give an inside look at the process of putting it all together. After working with my chorale students virtually and hearing what they can do individually at home, I got the idea to showcase them. The entire process of putting a show together is truly inspiring. The emotions and thoughts you have to go through to be able to tell a story is unlike any other field. It is very personal. Using that idea, I picked some fun songs that talk about the idea of togetherness and telling each other how magical it is to create art with one another."

From outstanding visual effects paired with the talents of our students—the virtual production of the Spring Musical will forever go down as one of the most beautiful and outstanding performances in Regina's history.

While last year's Orchesis Dance Company showcase "Elements" was performed without a hitch before the pandemic, this year's performance also adopted the mode of film. The Orchesis Dance Company Showcase "Metropolis" included music and choreography that was inspired by bright lights and big cities! Student-choreographed dances were showcased and captured beautifully on film-highlighting the talents of our Regina Dominican Panthers.

Between the Spring Musical and Orchesis Showcase, one question many asked was "how will this be performed?" Regina Dominican parents fearlessly answered by generously providing our community with the ultimate outdoor viewing experience for both the musical and Orchesis Dance show—a big screen on the athletic field!










Student Talent

BASKETBALL

The basketball program met the challenges of being the first sport to open up after the complete shutdown of all athletics. The team navigated one-on-one practices, advancing to group practices without contact, to finally having the ability to compete in a shortened season. The team celebrated five seniors in the one game where fans were allowed to be present. In the end, there was no tournament to compete in, but the athletes strengthened their appreciation for the game and their teammates.

BOWLING

The pinstriking Panthers had an interesting yet successful season! With COVID-19 restrictions in place, both Varsity and Junior Varsity competed "virtually." Under the incredible leadership of Coach Virginia Biegel and first-time Coach Elizabeth Michalek, Junior Varsity placed seventh overall in the GCAC Conference and Varsity placed fifth overall in the GCAC. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the Cross Country team competed in smaller meets this year. A few season highlights were when the Panthers beat rival Resurrection twice in dual meets, and based on IHSA Regional performance, advanced onto IHSA Sectional Meet.

GOLF

The Golf team finished their season 7-5. They placed fifth in both the GCAC Conference Tournament and Regionals out of 12 teams.

LACROSSE

The 2021 Lacrosse Program welcomed Coach Jack Hill this season. Through his leadership and collaboration with Assistant Coach Colleen Kaferly, the team remained dedicated in an unusual season and produced five wins and two all-conference players in the GCAC. MCDONELL AWARD

The McDonnell Award is named in honor of former Regina Dominican Administrator Patricia "Pat" McDonell, who retired in June 2019. This award celebrates her legacy and is presented to the athletic team with the highest grade point average during each sports season. The Tennis team won the award for the fall, while the Bowling team won for the winter and Soccer team won for the spring.

TRACK AND FIELD

While the indoor season was put on pause, the Track & Field team excelled during the outdoor season! **Kendall Williams '23** was awarded Athlete of the Meet (White Division) at GCAC Championship meet and both Kendall (long jump) and freshman **Sara Byrne '24** (high jump) qualified for IHSA State. This year the team also had the fastest 4 x 100M team in the last 15 years! Paws Up Panthers!

SOCCER

The soccer team finished in the top 16 in the state this season! They secured a regional championship and were sectional semi-finalists. This was the first time since 2006 they earned a spot in the sectional finals game. Regina Panthers had an all-sectional player, Laura Strenk '21 and an all-sectional honorable mention, Mary Storino '23—this is awarded by the IHSSCA—and two all-conference players, Laura Strenk '21 and Vicky Mando '21.

HER STORY STARTED HERE

CAROL ROSS BARNEY '66 DESIGNS REGINA'S NEW CAMPUS



Carol Ross Barney '66 has made a career out of seeing the potential in everything she designs. As the eldest of eight children, she has always been a leader, but her approach to design shows that she is a visionary too. As she sets Chicago up for a sustainable next century, Carol exemplifies leadership and service that Regina has held fast to over 63 years.

As a student in the 1960s, Carol soaked up all she could in our halls and learned to tap into her creativity at a young age thanks to guidance counselor, Sister Catherine Patrick. She told Sister Catherine that she wanted to be an architect when she grew up. "She didn't even flinch at the thought of a girl pursuing a traditionally male-dominated field," said Carol. "She researched and found the best schools for architecture. I was never told no, and that was inspiring."

Carol enrolled in the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign's Architecture program. After graduation, she used her time to be of service to others by joining the Peace Corps in Costa Rica where she worked on coral reef protection, restoration work, and housing. This work helped to shape her into the architect she is today. She envisions the way a project can help a community as well as foster sustainability. From the Riverwalk to CTA stations to the net-zero McDonald's flagship, Carol sees how people use an

environment and how her designs can transform the experience of interacting with these spaces.

A career highlight was being selected as the first female architect to design a federal building. Carol was tasked to create a replacement for the bombed Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City.

I have to tell you that going to Regina really prepared me for this job that is not often done by women."

She explains, "After we were selected to design the new Oklahoma Federal Building, we toured the site including the parking structure that survived the blast. The building manager took us to a protected and isolated corner of the garage and in a makeshift museum, he and other survivors had saved personal items



found in the rubble. It was that moment, in that leftover place, that I understood that the new design was not only about protection, but that the new Federal Building, while a state of the art defensive design, had to rekindle a sense of community; of open and free government for all people. The new design was about trust, remembrance and above all healing."

Drawing on her time as a student and now as a board member, Carol had many ideas about how to re-envision Regina's campus in the new master plan. Nonetheless, she wanted to learn from all who call Regina home. She asked the experts on Regina, our students, on what could be improved from their perspective. Through an app, they provided great insights into the school. Their top two requests were moving the lockers outside the classrooms and having air conditioning throughout the building.

Remarking about the importance of this project, she said, "My favorite job and the one that has been really filling my time lately is rethinking Regina for this century and for these students." Carol Ross Barney is uniquely positioned to be the architect of this project and we are grateful for her involvement.

REGINA RE-ENVISIONED: CAMPUS MASTER PLAN

After more than 60 years and over 10,000 alumnae, the time has come to design a campus that matches the dynamic, individualized educational opportunities we provide for our students.

Carol Ross Barney has thoughtfully re-envisioned each space to be a place where girls can collaborate, innovate, reflect, and grow as learners and as people. Together, we will transform the Regina experience for the young women and families we serve.

The campus features changes like:

- A student center at the front of the school comprising the spaces where students gather and collaborate, including meeting stairs, the cafeteria, and a library and learning lab.
- Developed and enhanced spaces that elevate learning at Regina Dominican—from a new chapel space where students can pray, meditate, and reflect, to arts spaces like a new dance studio and art room, and renovated music room.

- Redesigned STEM labs that will elevate our already stellar programming, as proven by the 40% of 2021 graduates who entered as STEM majors in college.
- Modernized athletic facilities that include air conditioning, a new roof and new thermal windows. We will also be updating our locker rooms, and we will create new athletic offices and team spaces as well as a new fitness center.
- Easily accessible administrative offices where students can access the school leadership and student services that define the Regina experience.
- More heightened security protocols ensuring student safety.
- A more environmentally-friendly campus, which is in lockstep with the Dominican value of sustainability.



ENROLLMENT NEWS

This year has proven that Regina Girls are not only resilient, but they are creative, dedicated, and inclusive and put into practice the foundations of *caritas & veritas*. The Enrollment Department navigated an untraditional recruitment season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In-person high school fairs and grade school visits went virtual and Girls Night In and the Entrance Exam were transformed to offer both in-person and virtual options for participants. The Good Samaritan is a Reginite

ANA MIYARES '86

Throughout her time at Regina Dominican, **Ana Miyares '86** learned about the importance of giving without any intention of receiving. Miyares is a photographer spending her time capturing people honored for their leadership and contributions to the world. Inspired by the altruism she witnessed in her daily life, she made the extraordinary decision to become a kidney

donor when she turned 50. Miyares said, "I'm not independently wealthy or capable of change at that scale, but every person I ever photographed during those ceremonies inspired and led me to make the decision to donate my kidney an easy one." Kidney donation was the ultimate way to give to another without any intention of receiving anything in return. Little did Miyares know she would find fellow Reginites along the way and receive a new extended family.

After months of testing and health screenings, Miyares still knew no one who needed a

kidney. As fate would turn out, her best friend knew someone in need of a kidney: the stepfather of her daughter's best friend, who was given two years to live without a transplant. It just so happened that his wife and stepdaughter were both Reginites (**Ann Carrera '97** and **Maggie Burke '21**.) Suddenly it was not a distant stranger, but someone within her world, a sign from God she thought.

In December 2019 after more testing, the two were officially a match and scheduled for the transplant for February 2020.

Also scheduled for a transplant that day was their surgical nurse and Regina alum, **Nora Davidson Trybula '95**. Miyares said of this discovery "faith kept revealing itself." Ana and her kidney recipient met briefly for the first time on the day of their surgery. Now over a year later, both are fully recovered and thriving. At this year's convocation, they met and finally were

able to share a grateful hug.

Miyares spoke to Regina students at convocation about her journey to becoming a kidney donor. She said, "While going to this extreme of donating an organ may not be for everyone, everyone, each of you, has a moral and ethical responsibility to do their part to contribute in small or big ways. The smallest acts of kindness are the most heartfelt. Maybe it's helping a neighbor with yard work, visiting a nursing home to read books or play board games with residents, leaving a post-it note with a special message

to brighten someone's day, give someone an unexpected compliment, return someone's shopping cart for them."

As a photographer, Miyares has photographed for Gift of Hope Organ & Tissue Donor Network. Gift of Hope works to save and enhance the lives of as many people as possible through organ and tissue donation. If you are interested in organ or tissue donation, visit their website at giftofhope.org.
